WELCOME TO PETERBOROUGH & THE KAWARTHAS

Peterborough & the Kawarthas is poised for growth. The region is home to a growing population of just over 151,000 residents and is forecasted to grow by 50% in the City of Peterborough and 29% in Peterborough County by 2051.

The region consists of the City of Peterborough and Peterborough County, which includes eight rural townships all located on the Treaty 20 territory and in the traditional territory of the Michi Saagiig and Chippewa Nations, collectively known as the Williams Treaties First Nations, and locally includes Curve Lake First Nation and Hiawatha First Nation.

The City of Peterborough, often called "the Electric City" as a nod to General Electric's presence and a long-standing reputation for innovation and sustainability, is home to three leading post-secondary institutions and a vibrant downtown core steps from the waterfront.

Together, Trent University, Fleming College, and Seneca College's School of Aviation – attract over 11,000 students annually to study. Additionally, the region is home to Lakefield College School, one of Canada's largest waterfront day and boarding schools, which attracts students from around the globe. The unique programs, research facilities, and faculty at our colleges and university encourage those who study here to use their academic learnings in real-world applications.

The regional economy is diverse, with several sectors of strength, including advanced manufacturing, aerospace, clean technology, tourism, agriculture, and small business. Healthcare and education are also significant local industries supporting growth and development.









THE PETERBOROUGH ADVANTAGE


Peterborough & the Kawarthas is well known as one of Canada's most sought-after cottage country destinations with vast scenic lakes and rivers of the historic Trent-Severn Waterway, rolling hills and farmlands, and bustling towns and villages surrounding the vibrant City of Peterborough. With a robust visitor economy, tourism and agriculture form the economic backbone of the surrounding County.

For generations, many have visited this region both to kick back and relax and kick it up with family and friends. Today, our region is home to more than 12,000 seasonal residents, in addition to more than 3 million visitors annually who contribute to a flourishing visitor economy with a wide variety of accommodations, dining experiences, festivals, attractions, and more.

We like to do things differently here in Peterborough & the Kawarthas. Members of our community range from new startups to seasoned professionals who approach business in creative and innovative ways.

Whether you're coming together at local events, building a strong network of business contacts, or gathering at the rink or field to cheer on your favourite team – Here, you will find the connection you need in a collaborative community of residents, business owners, students, and visitors who are not only committed to protecting the environment in a way that preserves its land and waterways but also its heritage, culture, and welcoming spirit, sharing a common belief that they have found an incredible place to live, work, study and play.











The Trent-Severn Waterway

Peterborough & the Kawarthas is situated along the Trent-Severn Waterway, a National Historic Site of Canada, one of the finest interconnected systems of navigation in the world. There are several marinas, including the popular Peterborough Marina located in the heart of downtown Peterborough, and 12 unique lock stations. Lock 19 is the gateway into the region from the Otonabee River and Rice Lake and spans all the way through the famed Kawarthas cottage country to Lock 31 in Buckhorn. Navigating the Trent-Severn Waterway was named a Journey of a Lifetime, and one of the World's 500 Greatest Trips by National Geographic. Boaters (and paddlers) can travel a significant portion here in Peterborough & the Kawarthas.



The Peterborough Airport

The Peterborough Airport has the longest paved, civil runway between Ottawa and Toronto. This full-service facility caters to both business and general aviation including fuel, oil, aircraft repairs, weather observation site, and charter service. Terminal operations feature Customs pre-clearance using CANPASS and a restaurant facility catering to local and transient traffic.



Cycling & Trails

The City of Peterborough has plentiful parkland and trails with more than 100 parks and sports fields. Whether you're exploring on foot or by bike, the interconnected trail system in the city, which has received Silver Bicycle Friendly designation from the Share the Road Cycling Coalition, makes getting around a breeze. Better yet, this infrastructure connects to the County of Peterborough via the Peterborough & the Kawarthas Classics Road Cycling Routes. Well maintained trails are also located throughout the region in communities such as Lakefield, Millbrook, and Keene, including the Kawartha Trans Canada Trail, which makes this area one of Ontario's most sought-after cycling destinations.



Train Service

The Government of Canada has committed to begin the process of procurement to build a new train service in the Toronto to Quebec City Corridor which would see the return of passenger train service to Peterborough. Until this is complete, the nearby Via Rail train station in Cobourg, Ontario is approximately 45 minutes from Peterborough, and Enterprise Car rental is available nearby.

GO Transit -Peterborough Terminal

Peterborough has a convenient GO Transit station located downtown with regularly scheduled bus service from Peterborough to Toronto Union Station that connects with Oshawa GO Trains.

Bus & Transit Services

Progressive Peterborough Transit provides contactless fare purchases using the HotSpot App, and provides regular, express, accessible van services as well as OnDemand services.

Always looking to improve access, The Link is a pilot project aiming to provide transit access from Selwyn Township, a rural community located in the County of Peterborough and Curve Lake First Nation to the City of Peterborough.




A TRANSFORMING ECONOMY





TALENT

Peterborough & the Kawarthas offers the best of both worlds – a growing population of young professionals and an average age slightly higher than the province at large. This means that our labour force offers the eagerness and recent educational experience of young professionals along with the life experience and mentorship abilities of more seasoned professionals – a dynamic coupling for business growth and expansion opportunities

Peterborough & the Kawarthas offers access to an eager, educated workforce, with 76.2% of the labour force attaining post-secondary credentials (higher than the provincial average of 71.8%). More than this, the workforce reflects that most local talent has pursued practical, applied learning either in the trades or with a college diploma.

Over 30% of our local labour force is employed in creative economy occupations, including strength in occupations involving health, education, law, and social, community and government services.

Education Levels



EDUCATIONAL ASSETS

Peterborough & the Kawarthas is home to three internationally recognized post-secondary education institutions in Fleming College, Trent University, and Seneca College's School of Aviation that provide top-quality talent to local businesses. These education institutions are an international draw, with students coming from across the globe to study.

Trent University

Trent is Ontario's top undergraduate university providing a transformative learning experience, recognized for creating global citizens prepared for leadership and career success. With over 100+ diverse and dynamic academic programs across the arts, sciences, social sciences and professional programs.



Seneca College

Seneca's Peterborough campus is a world-class home to students from the school of aviation. Home to Seneca's fleet of aircraft and flight training devices, used by students in the Honours Bachelor of Aviation Technology and Airline Pilot Flight Operations programs. Flight training and classroom instruction for students is carried out at the Peterborough Municipal Airport.




Fleming College

Fleming College is on a mission to empower students with the innovative education, research and real-world experience they will need to build better lives, better communities and a better world. There are 130+ full time programs in the arts & heritage, business, health & wellness, justice & community development, and trades & technology.

Fleming College: Kawartha Trades & Technology Centre

An 87,000-square-foot, world-class training facility built to LEED environmental and energy efficiency standards located at Fleming College's Sutherland Campus in Peterborough. The centerpiece of the Kawartha Trades and Technology Centre (KTTC) is the Skills Arena, a large, naturally lit space in which students from various trades programs learn together in an integrated setting. A three-storey structure within the Skills Arena, called the Kube, is itself an educational tool. The structure enables students to see and understand how different components and trades are related and interdependent during stages of a construction project. Many of the School of Trades and Technology programs are hosted at the KTTC.




THIS IS LIVING: PETERBOROUGH & THE KAWARTHAS
